Scripture Reading Matthew 2: 1-12, NRSV Lynnette Schuepbach

2 In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, ² asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising and have come to pay him homage." ³ When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; ⁴ and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. ⁵ They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea; for so it has been written by the prophet:

⁶ 'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah,

are by no means least among the rulers of Judah;

for from you shall come a ruler

who is to shepherd my people Israel."

⁷ Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. ⁸ Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." ⁹ When they had heard the king, they set out; and there, ahead of them, went the star that they had seen at its rising, until it stopped over the place where the child was. ¹⁰ When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. ¹¹ On

entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother; and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. ¹² And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

There has always been something holy about stars. We know that. You know that. The Magi *must* have known that.

So today we come to you in prayer, trusting that if you can paint the stars in the sky, Then surely you can hear us over the noise.

So first we pray for people wishing on stars:

We pray for those for whom 2020 was a year full of hospital rooms and isolation. We pray for those who lost love in 2020. We pray for those who lost life in 2020. We pray for those who lost a job, a home, or a sense of hope in 2020. We pray for parents forced to homeschool children in 2020, And for children who missed their friends in 2020.
