FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

WOW! It's been a long cold winter. It has snowed almost every Sunday since Christmas. I don't know about you, but I am really tired of all the cold and snow. I can't wait to be able to go outside in the warm spring air and work in the yard. Yard work brings me a sense of peace; it may be one of my God Spaces. God Space is those places where we seem to be able to relax and be present with God. Each of us has at least one space where we find an abundance of God's Grace. Maybe your space is in your car, or when you read a good book. Some find it in their moments of quiet prayer or in the peace of Yoga.

As I look around my garden I am a bit sad to see all the lifelessness of the plants. I miss the bountiful blooms on the hibiscus, the soft stalks on the pussy willow, and the waving of the leaves in the breeze. I must admit that when I look upon my garden now, it seems barren and dead. I am also worried a bit that the long cold winter has taken its toll on all those new plants from last year that may not have had enough time to establish their root system. I am sure that some of the plants will not make it, and I will need to replant again.

Still I am hopeful that in a few months, I will begin to see life return to the garden. Before long, new sprouts will appear on the hibiscus, and buds will be on the trees. Soon the grass will become green again, the pussy willows will bloom, and I will be blessed by the work of God in nature.

Sometimes we are like the garden. Sometimes we go through the Winter of the Soul, where we find ourselves cold and alone. Sometimes we can't feel the warmth of the Lord upon our faces. Sometimes it seems that all we can do is wait. There are many reasons for the Winter of the Soul. Sometimes there are health issues, financial issues, emotional issues, or others issues that bring us down. Still within us is the essence of God's Grace; and like the dormant plant, it lies hidden until it once again feels the warmth of the SON and begins to bloom. We must remember that soon the Winter will come to an end, and the Spring will come.

Nowhere is this clearer than in the Resurrection of our Lord Even though he entered into a time of death and was laid in a tomb, He soon felt the power of God and came to life again. Like the flower in my garden, He

sprang up in all His Glory. Unlike the flowers in the garden, He was even more glorious in the Resurrection than He was before. He also knew that He would never experience another Winter of the Soul, but would live forever in the Garden in Heaven.

While I look forward to the rebirth of my garden and all the beauty it will bring, I am more excited about the beauty and Glory I will experience when I go through that last Winter of the Soul and am raised with my Lord. Unlike the plants of my garden that may not survive this winter, I will survive this life and be in the Glorious Kingdom of Heave with Him forever.

When you experience the final Winter of the Soul, go to your God Space and be with Him, knowing that before long, you will experience all His Grace and be returned to new life in the Heavenly Kingdom.

RECYCLING

The River Valley Paper Company became our recycling company in November, 2013. From when we started through February, 2014, we have recycled 21,470 pounds of paper! This has earned us \$268.54.

They pick up our paper about once a week. We receive a check once a month, about mid-month.

Here's how it breaks down:

The payment is on a sliding scale based on the number of tons picked up. It's \$20, \$25 or \$30 per ton.

What does CROP stand for? When CROP began in 1947 (under the wing of Church World Service, which was founded in 1946), CROP was an acronym for the Christian Rural Overseas Program. Its primary mission was to help Midwest farm families to share their grain with hungry neighbors in post-World War II Europe and Asia.

Today, we've outgrown the acronym but we retain it as the historic name of the program. CROP Hunger Walks are interfaith hunger education and fundraising events sponsored by Church World Service and organized by CWS local offices across the U.S.

EDUCATE OURSELVES ABOUT GLOBAL ISSUES

We have just become a partner with Global Ministries, a joint venture between the UCC and Christian Church (Disciples of Christ). One of our commitments, besides "praying regularly for partners, missionaries and the world" is to "educate ourselves about global issues" as they pertain to the work being done by our churches' missionaries in far-flung areas of the world. Thus, some news about the Democratic Republic of the Congo.

Committed to developing and nurturing Partnerships of care, Global Ministries is focusing attention on the Democratic Republic of Congo for 2014 through The Congo Initiative. In 2011, both the UCC General Synod and Disciples General Assembly approved resolutions calling for reflection, education and advocacy on behalf of the people of the Congo. Over the past decade, approximately 6 million people have been killed in ongoing conflict and war for control of the Congo's vast mineral resources. As people who use cell phones and computers, we benefit from these mineral resources, but the conflict over them causes so much death and misery. We have a long history of engagement in the Congo (since 1899); and today through Global Ministries, our denominations continue this legacy. We cannot ignore our calling to walk in solidarity with sisters and brothers there.

On the back page of our worship bulletin for Sunday, March 23, was a letter written by Cheryl Sybrant, a laywoman who had traveled to the Congo recently, from one of our churches in Arkansas. In part, she wrote:

In Brazzaville, there was a young man on guitar playing "How Great Thou Art", while the minister prayed. I felt so unworthy because all I could think was 'God, things don't look so great.' But despite the destruction around us,

they spoke with incredible perspective and compassion. The minister gave this directive: 'When you go back home, don't only be ambassadors for Africa, because there are places worse off than we are.'


Strongsville United Church of Christ Organ Restoration Committee Update Meeting March 2, 2014

In March of 2011 the Congregation voted to hire Leek Pipe Organ of Oberlin to restore our existing pipe organ. The purpose of this meeting is to provide an update on this project.

Funds:

To date we have raised \$127,000. No funds have come from the church budget.





Progress:

Two of four phases have been completed. The electronics of the console are done and the Great Division has been restored. The two remaining divisions, the Choir and Swell, are still in need of restoration.

Phase I: \$59,000 COMPLETED Phase II: \$30,000 COMPLETED

Leek discovered voicing and bellows issues that will need attention. This was not in the original quote because the organ was unplayable when the initial quotes were made. The financial breakdown is as follows:

Phase III Costs:

Original Phase III Choir Division Restoration \$37,500¹
Bellows repair \$5,700
Voicing of five ranks \$16,000
Proposed Total Cost of Phase III \$59,200

We plan to do Phase III restoration some time in 2014 in order to take advantage of Leek Organ's price lock on the quote.

¹ James Leek has locked in this price until February 28 of 2015.

It is to our advantage to complete the voicing during Phase III because James Leek is able to voice five ranks for the price of three ranks since the pipes are already in the shop. If he voiced three ranks separately the cost would be \$18,000. The work will still need to be done but will cost more if we do it in small segments. James Leek can also offer us a discount on the bellows work if done during Phase III for the same reason. If the bellows were repaired independently that price would be \$8,300.

SPRING PLANT SALE 2014

Snow on the ground, wintry mix of snow and rain, no school days, traffic a mess due to the weather..... How does one think about planting spring flowers?

It's easy! Just look at the Spring Plant Sale order form and imagine your yard displaying these beautiful flowers! We know spring will come. We may just need to be more patient this year. And we need to be ready when it does come!

The Spring Plant Sale is the annual fundraiser for the Official Board. The funds support many of the expenses of the church. We take only advance orders for flats of flowers (20 plants), hanging baskets and 5" pots of flowers. Maria Gardens will again supply the flowers. Consider a way to help the church and reach out to others – ask a neighbor or friend or family member if they are interested in placing an order.

The following flats will be available – Begonias, Marigolds (short) and Petunias. There are still no impatiens due to a disease. We will also have 10" hanging baskets - Begonias, Fuchsias, Gerber Daisies, Geraniums and Boston Ferns. There will be 5" pots of Geraniums (zonal geraniums, slightly larger than our usual seeded geraniums), New Guinea Impatiens and Gerber Daisies.

The plants will be delivered to the church and need to be picked up by the person placing the order or a designated person. We do not have storage or security to keep the plants overnight.

The profit is spent on church expenses as decided by the Official Board. Last year our profit was \$633.30! Our costs went up for all the flowers by five or ten cents but we did not raise our prices.
