FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK

In just a few weeks, the season of Lent begins. All of us have heard about Lent and the many traditions it conjures in our minds. However, most of us do not understand some of the Lenten traditions that we practice. Let's look at some of the Lenten basics:

First, what is Lent? Lent is a season of preparation for the great day of Easter. Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 13, and continues until Easter morning. Some of us begin Lent one day earlier on Fat Tuesday or Marti Gras by having a huge celebration or party where we overindulge on things we might not do during Lent. The carnival celebrations in Louisiana are the most well known of these events, and people who attend often do things that they would never do at home. The party is often wild and flamboyant with richly decorated floats and people parading through the French Quarter. Strings of beads are thrown from person to person in recognition of approval for rather risqué acts. The more strands of beads you collect, the better.

Some churches have pancake suppers, often run by youth groups, where people come and eat all the sweet pancakes they want. They do this as a way of overindulging before giving up sweets for the next 40 days. Youth groups sometimes make enough money that they can support the youth program for the entire year. Other churches have fish fries every Friday during Lent—both to make money and to adhere to the custom of not eating meat during Lent. I personally love fish fries and may visit some churches to see who does the best job. Fasnachts are sugary donuts created for Lent. Now we eat donuts on any occasion.

Some of us challenge ourselves by giving up sweets or smoking or some other thing we like to do for Lent. Some have even given up intimacy for the season, something that Jack sternly says NO to doing. In the past I have tried to abstain from all solid food for the season. During this time I survive on liquids only, and then only those liquids with the least food value. I do so not to show how strong I am, but to place myself in a position to be open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit. I use as my example those who fasted for 40 days before having a special conversation with the Lord. Fasting is a long tradition in the life of the church. However, I most often fall short of the full fast after 4-5 weeks. I'm not sure what I will do this year.

Some have chosen a different approach and decided to ADD something to their lives during Lent. Some start a new Bible or prayer time. Others step up and take on new challenges at the church, while others reach out to do extra service in the community. Some who fast choose to give the money they save on food or whatever they give up and instead give to funds to the food bank for the poor.

I have even witnessed some who have taken the opportunity to give up things like bigotry and hatred. Some have tried to renew old relationships and seek new understandings about some of the things that vexed them over the years. A friend of mine used this time to study homelessness even to the point of sleeping several nights in a makeshift shelter so she could understand what homelessness was all about. Another chose to study the subject of homosexuality and all the feelings he had around that issue. When he opened his heart, he was changed by what he heard and saw.

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday and lasts 40 days until Easter. Now if you do the count, that's 46 days. This is true, but Sundays during Lent are free days, where you are not bound by your promise. You can indulge in those things you have given up for Lent if you choose. This was decreed by a Pope long ago to keep those who fast from starving and has become the tradition of today.

One more thing! Before you decide what you will do for Lent, remember that your promise is between you and God. This is a promise that you must do your best to keep. When it becomes difficult to hold to your promise, pray and God will help you. Whatever you do, I pray that it will lead you to a renewed relationship with God the Father, Jesus the Christ and the Holy Spirit.



SEMINARY SUNDAY/CHURCH VOCATIONS SUNDAY FEBRUARY 24, 2013

Thanks to many of the 2,000 UCC congregations in the Mid-West who receive a special offering for our three CUE seminaries—Chicago, United (Twin Cities, MN), and Eden (St. Louis, MO)—their students continue to receive first-class theological training, which otherwise would not be financially possible. Tuition and scholarships currently pay about 32% of the total costs of seminary education each year. CUE receipts of \$645,000 (2011) from congregations cover another 7%. The balance comes from personal contributions from graduates, endowments/legacies, and corporate gifts. Last year, Strongsville UCC members contributed \$155. A CUE envelope is included in this newsletter for a special offering to be received on Sunday, February 24. Your gift, and prayers for our seminaries are much appreciated.

Second-career seminary and church educators/missionaries, etc. are increasingly filling U.S. seminaries of every denomination. Exciting things are happening in religion and in congregations.
